Main Speakers:

Dr. James McPherson, professor of History, Princeton University. Author of Hallowed Ground: A Walk At Gettysburg and Battle Cry of Freedom, for which he was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for nonfiction.

Dr. David Martin, archivist at the Peddie School. Author of Gettysburg: July 1. Dr. Martin will be discussing Union Corps Commanders at Gettysburg.

Mr. Jeffry Wert, retired high school history teacher. Author of several books including the forthcoming (April 2005) book, The Sword of Lincoln: The Union Army of the Potomac. Mr. Wert will be discussing the Lee-Longstreet Controversy at Gettysburg.

Breakout Session Speakers:

Mr. Troy Harman, NPS Gettysburg National Military Park. Author of Lee's Real Plan. Mr. Harman will be discussing his book and examining the evidence that General Lee's plan remained unchanged throughout the three day battle.

Mr. Patrick Falci, Actor, Performing Historian. Mr. Falci will be discussing General A. P. Hill at the battle of Gettysburg. He appeared in the movie Gettysburg. His performance is very lively, as well as educational.

Ms. Jane C. Peters Estes, Civil War lecturer, will be answering the question, "Where were the women at Gettysburg?" Ms. Peters Estes discussion will focus on the residents of the town as well as women who came to Gettysburg with the armies.

Mr. Craig Caba, former president of the GBPA, will be discussing the Underground Railroad at Gettysburg.

Mr. Stanley D. Saperstein, first person re-enactor. Mr. Saperstein will be discussing the U.S. Sharpshooters at Gettysburg.

Mr. George Wunderlich, Executive Director of the Museum of Civil War Medicine in Frederick, MD. Mr. Wunderlich will be discussing Camp Letterman and Civil War Medicine.
